Pledge of Allegiance and moment of silence for our armed forces.

SUPERVISOR'S OPENING COMMENTS

Supervisor Oliverio said that tonight is a long meeting with a lot of good stuff on it and important issues. We would like to change the agenda and move the Departmental Reports.

RESOLUTION #R17-96

RESOLVED to move the Departmental Reports from # 6 on the agenda to # 3 on the agenda at the February 15, 2017 Town Board Meeting.

DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS

Introduction by Supervisor Oliverio

First up is Fire Department Chief David Anderson. Chief Anderson reported on the Fire Department's month of January 2017 calls:

This is a total of 27 calls for the month; 430 man hours. Chief Anderson added that if you are going to use your chimney please make sure it is cleaned out and maintained because there has already been a few chimney fires this last month. Thank you.

Councilwoman then introduced Larry Cobb, Highway Superintendent

Supervisor Cobb thanked Joe Hertelendy and the guys for doing an outstanding job during our two (2) major snowstorms. He said it is hard keeping up with the snow when it is falling so quickly. Our main goal is to keep everything open for the Fire Department and Ambulance Corp. to get through. It is also stressful for the guys out on the road and they work very hard. Please also remember not to put the snow from your driveway back out on the road. It is illegal to do that, and you can be summoned, so throw the stuff to the right of your driveway. Dr. Wills, the Superintendent of the Putnam Valley School District also thanked Supervisor Cobb for the work he and his crew did to keep the roads clear so the children could get to school. Supervisor Cobb said that he and his men are currently working on fixing potholes and cutting down trees. If you have any questions please call or email us. Supervisor Oliverio thanked the Highway Department and said that they did an awesome job. He stated that during the storms he was in constant contact with Supervisor Cobb and he appreciates the effort you and your men put in.

Supervisor Oliverio introduced and welcomed, student, Sal LaPeccerella as an intern working through the Putnam Valley High School at Town Hall to see if this is something he wants to do in the future. He gets to see and participate in all aspects of the daily workings of Town Government. Sal rose from his seat and explained how the program works - it gives kids the opportunity to feel what it's like to work in government - then he has to make a project out of what he experienced for class. He feels it is an excellent program and he is very excited about it.

Councilman Mackay read an announcement for Town Assessor Luongo. It said that many of our Senior Citizens have not renewed their Enhanced STAR, Disability Exemption or Senior Exemption. This must be done no later than March 1, 2017 by 4:00 PM anything received after that will be used for the 2018 tax year. PROCLAMATION: GERMAN AMERICAN CLUB OF PUTNAM VALLEY AND **PEEKSKILL**

Presented by Councilwoman Annabi

Councilwoman Annabi said we occasionally lose our power, heat, and access to our computers here in Town. In the past we have used the Senior Center as a warming station but it has not always been available to us for one reason or another because it is a County run facility. Our German American Social Club has stepped up to be a warming/comfort station for the Town of Putnam Valley. They have opened their doors to us and we would like to recognize them for their benevolence.

Councilwoman Annabi read the proclamation to Mr. Schramek and the Board of the German American Club of Putnam Valley and Peekskill.

Mr. Schramek thanked the Town Board and said that the German American Social Club of Putnam Valley and Peekskill began in 1936 as a small group; they moved to Putnam Valley and currently have over 100 active members. They feel they are very important neighbors, and like to support the groups in Town such as the Little League etc. Because of the generosity they have garnered over the years from the people of Putnam Valley they would like to give back. They have a brand new heating/air conditioning system, state of the art generators, and they are updating their kitchen - and they want to share this. "Our place is your place". Thank you for the recognition and thanks for being there for us as well, it's an honor. We really appreciate this. He then introduced the rest of his Board to the Town Board.

PRESENTATION BY THE HUDSON HIGHLANDS LAND TRUST ON THE ACQUISITION OF GRANITE MOUNTAIN PROPERTY

Presented by Supervisor Oliverio

Michele Smith, Executive Director of the Hudson Highlands Land Trust, said that she was proud to say that two (2) weeks ago they acquired three (3) parcels of land on Granite Mountain which will be used for a publically accessible park for everyone to use. It is 360 acres and there will be hiking trails etc. There are also some nearby parcels that are owned by the County which are being saved for conservation, maybe sometime in the future we can partner with the County for some hiking trails. This idea to purchase these parcels came from the Town's Comprehensive Plan of 2007, this is very important to them as a Land Conservation Group. The Plan identified needs for open space in the southern area of Putnam Valley.

The Hudson Highlands Land Trust is a community based land trust which protects and conserves natural resources. Their mission is to protect and conserve land - which protects the natural resources, the rural character, and the scenic beauty of the Hudson Highlands. Included in their mission area is the entire watershed of the Peekskill Hollow Brook which includes most of Putnam Valley and Phillipstown. The land they purchase to protect is determined by a scoring system. Granite Mountain scored well in terms of natural resources, diverse forests, is important to the Town's ground water sources has nice biodiversity, and the input of the community through the Comprehensive Plan. The map of the Town that was shown by Ms. Smith showed that quite a few people live around Granite Mountain; so many people will be able to walk to the area. This Sunday, there will be a community forum about what the usage of the land will be, where you can park to use it, public safety, etc. The meeting is being held at the Putnam Valley Grange at 2:30 PM. There will be a question and answer period. Supervisor Oliverio commented on the fact that we all have wells, and we rely on the aquifer for our water and this is such a great thing for our Town.

PRESENTATION BY JILL VARRICCHIO ON THE PUTNAM COUNTY ECONOMIC **DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION**

Presented by Supervisor Oliverio

Jill Varricchio, President of the Putnam County Economic Development Corporation, explained that they are a private/public Organization (501-C 6) and 2016 was their 20th year in operation. They are the primary facilitators connecting local resources with opportunities to deliver economic growth. They work to cultivate and expand existing businesses as well as promote commercial real estate to attract new business. They market the County Assets, (proximity to the City), our links, our infrastructure and our highly skilled work force. They advocate for development projects among the Municipalities and Planning Boards to assure the growth of the Counties tax base. They educate and assist small businesses etc. They strive for a balanced growth to meet the needs of a broad audience. Studies have been done which find that the Commercial Sector contributes more to a Municipalities Budget Revenue than it uses in Municipal Services. A community's economic health is tied to its Commercial Development.

COUNTY LEGISLATOR REPORT

Presented by Supervisor Oliverio

County Legislators Bill Gouldman and Barbara Scuccimarra were unable to be in attendance as they were at a very important meeting in the County.

SCHOOL DISTRICT REPORT

Presented by Supervisor Oliverio

Dr. Fran Wills spoke of some of the schools successful programs. So many of these programs are a mix of educational and emotional programming; so the students can also learn skills to help and intervene in problems - they can use these skills for the rest of their lives. This is applied or abstract learning - it is not just educational learning.

The school play this year is Billy Elliott. The Make a Difference Club is once again sponsoring a free show and dinner for the Town's Senior Citizens as they do every year. Supervisor Oliverio said that the architect working on the Parks and Rec. building has gone into the School's and showed the students the drawings for the new building. Joel Greenberg, the Architect, said the kids were engaged and interested, and asked a lot of questions. Dr. Wills went on to say that the High School graduation rate is 96% in Putnam Valley this year and that is one of the highest in the State we are very excited about this. Next year we are looking at a new schedule for the High School with more blocks for project oriented work. In consideration, for the second half of the year, they are looking to start the High School at a later time to give the students a little more sleep which studies show aid in their learning. Assemblymen Byrnes did a "Valentines for Soldiers" at the school today. She added that everyone should watch the School Board Meetings - a lot of very important information comes out of them, or get the app so you can watch them on your phone. Along with all the presentations, and there is a lot of other information about our District. Councilwoman Annabi asked her to speak about the new anonymous alerts program. Dr. Wills said that there is now an anonymous alerts program which allows parents or students to report something that may be bothering them - or something they saw such as alcohol use, drug use, bullying, and suicidal thoughts etc. which they may find hard to say face to face. If you use this program no one will know who you are unless you say who you are; they can then investigate these reports.

Jill Figarella, School District Treasurer, spoke next; she said that there is a School Board Meeting tomorrow night. Putnam Valley also has an on line newsletter. You can subscribe to get the newsletter by going on the School's website. They are ready to start presenting parts of next year's school budget. She will present the full budget at the end of March; and it will be tax cap compliant. The budget vote will be on May 16th; there will be a proposition on the budget for an energy performance contract. This would allow the District to do energy saving installation of equipment, window and lighting upgrades, which pays for itself in the long run. The Elementary School will be getting geothermal heating in part of the Building, which would mean they would use no oil. The State Education Department will only approve the project if it will pay for itself over the life of the project which is 15 years. The cafeteria at the Elementary School will finally be getting air conditioning. If the District approves the proposition the State will give them an extra 10% in aid.

Councilwoman Annabi said that everyone is aware of what is going on at 31 Orchard. At the last meeting we had residents from Floridan here saying how dangerous that home is for the children of Floradan. We had given the owners and the mortgage holders a chance to board up the building, which they did not; in fact, they did nothing to make it safer for the children of Floridan. Our Town Engineer, Todd Atkinson, presented a report which said that nothing has been done to make the building secure and additionally it is structurally unsound – due to these facts I would like to pass the Resolution. Supervisor Oliverio strongly agreed.

A Resolution having been issued by the Town Board on December 7, 2016 directing the filing and service of a Notice of Unsafe and Dangerous Structure at 31 Orchard Road, Putnam Valley, New York - Tax Parcel: 83.12-3-46; and such Notice having been executed by the Supervisor of the Town of Putnam Valley on December 7, 2016; and such Notice having been filed with the Clerk of Putnam County on January 11, 2017 and served upon the owner and any person having a vested or contingent interest in such unsafe building as evidenced by the Affidavits of Service annexed hereto; and a hearing having been held on January 18, 2017 at 6:00 p.m. at the Town Hall located at 265 Oscawana Lake Road, Putnam Valley, New York 10579; and Marwan Daoud, Ralph Capodieci, Virginia Melendez Capodieci, Edward Wallach, and Israel Moultra having appeared and testified at the hearing upon the aforesaid Notice of Unsafe and Dangerous Structure or the order contained therein; and the Board having considered the testimony offered at the hearing; having reviewed and approved the minutes of the public hearing and the Board's findings of fact and determination; and having further considered the reports of the Town Building Inspector and the Town Engineer heretofore submitted; and having further considered the records of the Town of Putnam Valley Building Department; and the Affidavits of Service and reports of title submitted by Special Counsel; and there having been no evidence of boarding, securing, repair, demolition and/or removal of the building as of the date hereof, and more than thirty (30) days having elapsed after the service of said Notice of Unsafe and Dangerous Structure as evidenced by the Certification of the Town Of Putnam Valley Code Enforcement Officers dated February 10, 2017 and February 14, 2017, copies of which are annexed hereto;

NOW THEREFOR:

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town Board hereby reaffirms its prior resolution dated December 7, 2017 ordering the demolition and removal of the building located at 31 Orchard Road, and adopts the Findings of Fact and Determination of even date herewith; and

BE IT RESOLVED, that the demolition and removal, backfilling and seeding of the unsafe structure located at 31 Orchard Road will be undertaken by the Town of Putnam Valley with all deliberate speed in accordance with the provisions of Section 66-9 of the Town Code of Putnam Valley; provided however, that such demolition and removal work shall not commence until at least 120 days from December 7, 2016 in order to provide interested parties with an opportunity to seek judicial review; and

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town Supervisor and/or the Code Enforcement Officer is hereby authorized to solicit competitive bids for such demolition and removal and award an appropriate Contract for same subject to approval of the Town Board; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that should any person having an interest in the subject property not have received proper service of the Notice of Unsafe and Dangerous Structure dated December 7, 2016, and an opportunity to be heard at the January 18, 2017 hearing, such person(s) may request a hearing before the Town Board upon written request delivered to the Town Clerk on or before March 14, 2017; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that in accordance with Town Code Section 66-10 all expenses incurred by the Town in connection with the proceedings to repair and secure or demolish and remove the unsafe building, including the cost of actually removing such building, shall be assessed against the land on which such building is located and shall be levied and collected in the same manner as provided in Article 15 of the Town Law of the State of New York for the levy and collection of a special ad valorem levy.
