VOTE ON BAN OF ICE RETARDANT DEVICES ON LAKE OSCAWANA

Presented by Supervisor Oliverio

Supervisor Oliverio said the Town Board has discussed this matter for the past three (3) months and we have studied it since last winter when the person fell through the ice. LOMAC has also given us much information and we have had three (3) Public Hearings on this issue. The bottom line is life over property - it's that simple. Government was established and it's only real function is for the health and safety of its residents.

Town Clerk Howard read the law:

RESOLUTION #R19-335

RESOLVED that "Effective January 1st, 2020, the use of any ice retardant device, mechanism (deicer, bubbler or aerator) or chemical within the entire Lake Oscawana Water Body and/or along the shoreline of the entire Lake Oscawana Water Body, is completely and totally banned from use. Anyone failing to comply with this law will be levied a \$1,000.00 fine and face confiscation of the offending device. Subsequent offenses by the same individual or property owner will result in a doubling of the preceding fine.

By a vote of 4 ayes, 0 nays, and 1 absent the law is passed.

Supervisor Oliverio said every lake front property owner who lives in Lake Oscawana will be getting a notification about this new law. He said he knows many of you are upset by this decision, but we the Board have spoken about this at great length. We have spoken to our Counsel and many neighboring Towns. When we are confronted with a life over property situation, we have to go with life to ensure the safety of our residents. If anyone sees any of these devices in operation you must contact us immediately and we will enforce this.

Councilperson Annabi said we must make it clear that the Town Board does **NOT** condone any activities that take place on the ice because it is just not safe. You have to use common sense.

2019 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PUTNAM VALLEY COMMISSION FOR THE CONSERVATION OF THE ENVIRONMENT

The Commission for the Conservation of the Environment (CCE) is presenting this annual report as mandated in the Town Code.

The CCE currently consists of Michael Usai, Mia Azcue, Pat Grove, Friedel Muller-Landau, Eileen Reilly, Julie Ruben, and Glenn Sapir. Town Board Member Wendy Whetsel is the CCE's liaison to the Town Board.

The CCE continued its efforts to establish the mechanism allowing it to best fulfill its role as identified in the Town Code. It wishes to act in an advisory role to town officials and boards and an educator to the town's populace. Having completed the Natural Resources Inventory, the CCE presented the NRI's maps and accompanying reports to the Town Board for use by that body, the Planning Board, the Zoning Board of Appeals, the Town Wetlands Inspector, the Town Engineer, any other officials who might find the NRI of use and town residents. Bound copies were presented to the Town Board, other town officials and the Putnam Valley Library. As a next step, the CCE entertained a presentation on undertaking the development of an Open Space Inventory, which would identify and prioritize open spaces that are important to the community. This would open the door to potential grants and the possibility of establishing a Community Preservation Fund. An OSI features two parts: an inventory of undeveloped lands that the community wants to see protected; and a map that shows these lands, in the community's levels of priority to protect them, placed in parcels.

Chair Mike Usai has had discussions with Bruce Barber to provide CCE input in the updating of the town's Comprehensive Plan.

The CCE has reached out to the Putnam Valley High School in an effort to recruit two student members, and that process continues.

As mentioned in last year's Annual Report, the CCE strives to protect our environment and, thus, the physical and mental health of our residents and their property. One way we wish to accomplish this goal is through education.

In that pursuit, to raise the awareness of the diversity of wildlife within Putnam Valley, the CCE coordinated a "What's in Your Backyard" photo competition for P.V. residents who photographed wildlife in our town. The CCE culled 20 photos from several dozen submissions, then framed and displayed those photos at CCE's table at Town Day. The CCE followed this up with a meet-and-greet in November at the P.V. Library and a continuing exhibit of the 20 winning photos in the library's Community Room throughout the rest of the year.

CCE's educational efforts also included adding Eco-Tips posted on the town website and the CCE's Facebook page.

Mr. Sapir said these maps will be very helpful to people and should be used. One of these maps identifies endangered species located in Town. The maps and report has been presented to the Town. There is a copy at the Putnam Valley Library.

Putnam Valley Free Library Director, Dede Farabaugh, spoke at the podium. She said even if there is bad weather or being that the library is closed on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day and again on New Year's Day you can always view library content on your digital devices at the website entitled "Hoopla". Free museum passes are available courtesy of our Friends Group to visit many museums in the New York area either for free or at a reduced rate.

Book Club will be meeting on the second Thursday in January – the book is entitled, <u>A Gentleman in Moscow</u>". The Read it and Watch it Program will be meeting later in January. They will be reading and watching <u>Where'd You Go Bernadette</u>?

Supervisor Oliverio said the one (1) regret this year he had with the library is that the 414 did not pass. He hopes the library will try again. It would have been a tremendous achievement for the library. Councilperson Annabi said she would like to discuss a couple of things that came up with this. She said the Mahopac Library has a 414 which goes through their School Tax Bill. This may leave some Putnam Valley residents who also pay taxes to Mahopac paying double library taxes. The 414 for Putnam Valley would have been added to their property taxes. This needs to be cleared up.

Town Board member-elect Ralph Smith made mention of a grant Ms. Farabaugh applied for and got for the library. Ms. Farabaugh said the Library got two (2) grants this year. One (1) grant came from the Community Foundation of the Hudson Valley. This grant is for two (2) classes – one (1) which is an ESL class for non-native English speakers and the other is for a Spanish conversation class for non-native Spanish speakers. These classes will take place in the spring. The other grant we received from the New York State Library Construction Fund will be used for one-half the cost of our electronic sign which will also go up in the spring.

Town Board Member Luongo spoke on behalf of the Putnam Valley Fire Department. He said this Saturday, December 21st is the annual "Candy Cane Run" which starts at 8:00 AM. This year's boot drive will be at Oregon Corners and Adams Corners, come and get your candy cane. Please do not overload the circuits when putting up Christmas decorations. If you have a live Christmas tree keep them well watered and be careful if you have candles on them.

The Sheriff's Department does a great job as well. They really live the motto of health and safety.

LEGISLATORS REPORT

Supervisor Oliverio said County Legislator Gouldman and County Legislator Montgomery were unable to be here tonight because they are attending the County's end of the year audit meeting.

Councilperson Annabi read County Legislator Gouldman's report as follows:

Legislator Bill Gouldman apologies for not being here today, but he is in an Audit Committee meeting and a County Year End Meeting. He wishes everyone a Happy Holidays.

Putnam County is currently accepting applications for 2020 Pilot Student Internship Program. This program gives students an opportunity to have a hands on real world experience and also gives them a chance to learn the role of county government in our community. Applications must be submitted online till January 31. If you know someone who would be interested in this go onto the Putnam County Website or just let Legislator Gouldman know. This is a great program, take advantage of it.

The Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) is available to all residents who qualify. It is a program that assists low income New Yorkers with the cost of heating their home. HEAP also offers an emergency benefit for households in a heat or heat related Emergency. If you need assistance please call the Putnam Department of Social Services at 845-808-1500.

In response to concerns about the matter of the Putnam County Administration's consideration of rescinding the weight restriction on Peekskill Hollow Road, Legislator Gouldman added this matter on to the Physical Services Committee Meeting which was held last night. He would like to thank Supervisor Oliverio and several other community members who attended in opposition of this. It was a very good and constructive meeting and nothing will be done at the moment.

Recently Metro North proposed to increase the Parking Fees and Eliminating Free Saturday Parking. This past week we found that they have taken this off the table for at least one year. Legislator Gouldman and the full County Legislature sent a letter to the Chair and CEO of the MTA and

Putnam Counties representative on the MTA Board Neal Zuckerman said that we helped to avert the increase.

Resident Del Jones said she would like to discuss the project on Peekskill Hollow Road. Supervisor Oliverio said he went to a meeting last night at the County where the Legislature decided to create a Commission consisting of our Counsel, their Counsel, the Highway Department representatives, and members of the community. Supervisor Oliverio thinks they should leave Peekskill Hollow Road alone. Ms. Jones said they seem to be unaware of the distances on Peekskill Hollow Road. Even with their idea of widening the road and straightening the road, it will still not prohibit the increasing speeds of the trucks. Supervisor Oliverio said it is not even that, it is the removing of the weight limit restriction from Peekskill Hollow Road that we forced them to put on the road all those years ago. This will create a nightmare traveling down that road along with 18 wheelers, you will be taking your life in your hands. Ms. Jones said the DEC should be involved due to the impact this will make on the air and water quality; not to mention the truck debris that will be left on the side of the road. Lifting the weight restriction will also contribute to the destruction of the road itself with the sheer weight of these trucks. Having these large trucks on the road will also take away from the quality of life and the scenic beauty.

Resident Peter Kirchner who resides on Peekskill Hollow Road said one (1) of the mystifying things is where is the motivation for lifting this weight limit? It doesn't serve the community well and the trucking interests have other routes. This is a dire threat to our community with no clear public benefit. We should instead be talking about strengthening the protection of that road. Mr. Kirchner would like the Town to take ownership of the road if the County is willing so it would have better protection. That would put the residents at a higher priority. This would not be an easy process but would be worth it. Supervisor Oliverio said we don't have a lot here in the way of businesses; but what we do have is the most rural nature of any of the six (6) Towns in Putnam County. That's what attracts people here, and if we give that up we are just another basic suburb. One (1) 18 wheeler causes the same damage as 9000 passenger cars, even Commissioner Pena from the County admitted this. There are some many people and kids on this road all the time, it is not a thoroughfare for trucks. Mr. Kirchner said he would appreciate it if the Town could become a steward for the road. Councilperson Annabi said Commissioner Pena from Putnam County wants to lift the weight limit on Peekskill Hollow Road, because they can't enforce it. She does like Mr. Pena but does not like this decision and we can't let this go, it's not something we want. She added please residents of Putnam Valley reach out to your politicians and tell them it's not something we want here. We can look into taking over the road – she is not sure that is something we can do, but we can look into it. We do have to maintain the rural character that we have now. Trucks should not be coming down 301 into Putnam Valley.

Councilperson Luongo said the same is true of Oregon Corners. The plans the County has for Oregon Corners are way overdeveloped. We do not need a turning lane like they have on Westbrook Drive and Route 6. It is too much for what we need. We need to improve and maintain what we have. We do allow for all local deliveries but it should not be a main thoroughfare.

Resident Eileen Reilly said she agrees with what has been said so far. She sent letters to our County Legislators, Town Supervisor, and others. She said Tinker Hill Road was mentioned at that meeting, do you think the fact that we are not allowing trucks on that road anymore has something to do with this decision? Supervisor Oliverio said the argument that was made was that the truck that ended sliding down Tinker Hill did so because they knew that they could not converse Peekskill Hollow. So they came in on Peekskill Hollow (which they shouldn't have) and then cut up the Oscawana Heights Road, came across, and then they only way to go back down was Tinker Hill Road. This makes no sense because you are illegally on the road anyway and it wasn't a local delivery. Ms. Reilly said I live there are and the signs are misleading because if you follow them they make no sense. Send the trucks to Route 9 or Route 6, Ms. Reilly almost had an accident because of a box truck on Peekskill Hollow Road. This all needs to be straightened out because our Town was not designed for this. Ms. Reilly thinks the Commission is a great idea. Supervisor Oliverio said don't forget the weight limit still remains.

Counsel Florence said there are two (2) points. One (1) is it's the public interest versus very few private interests. Private interests are motivated by financial interests because the shorter the distance a truck has to go the less gas they use. This comes at the expense of the public because a private person is not obeying the rules. The second point is that a driver in that instance is trying to avoid the police because they are doing something that they are not allowed to do. In the truck accident that occurred here the truck polluted the Hollowbrook which is the drinking water for thousands of people. That was all just about having a shortcut.

Resident Victor Tiship said he lives off of Peekskill Hollow Road and is also speaking about the astonishingly ill- conceived and dangerous proposal he found out about at the Traffic Safety Board meeting. Mr. Tiship said this is solely coming from Putnam County Highway Commissioner Pena and his desire to rescind the truck weight restriction — which he never wanted in the first place. Trucks use GPS devices to get places and there are two (2) kinds of GPS devices — a civilian and a commercial. Trucks by law must use the commercial. Sometimes truckers also use their cell phones which have not been notified when changes are made to the commercial GPS system. When the original weight restriction law was passed it had overwhelming support from the County Legislators, the Town Board, and the residents. The danger that these trucks pose to the road bed, which is another consideration beside public safety, is part of the current vehicle traffic law. The rationale for rescinding this weight restriction is that if the truck that went down on Tinker Hill had been able to be on Peekskill Hollow Road this incident would not have happened.

Mr. Tiship asked the Town Board to pass another resolution to protect the road. He noted that Mr. Pena is an appointed official not elected and works for the people. Pressure needs to be brought to bear on the Legislator and the County Executive to remember why we had that law passed in the first place. We know local deliveries are exempted but not for through trucks, they should be on Route 6 and Route 9. Mr. Tiship hopes the public gets angry and Mr. Pena has no leg to stand on legally. This is an absurd and curious proposal because it only benefits private entities.

Supervisor Oliverio said hearing no other public comments this part of the meeting is closed.
