PUBLIC HEARING

CHANGES IN CODE FOR ADVISORY BOARD ON ARCHITECTURE AND COMMUNITY APPEARANCE (ABACA)

Supervisor Annabi opened the Public Hearing.

Supervisor Annabi said we would like to streamline the ABACA process to make it easier for both the members of ABACA and the residents coming before the Planning and Zoning Boards.

Resident and ABACA Member Del Jones said there are issues with paper documents. One (1) reason is that we have no place to store paper documents. ABACA also decided that they need a way to review projects in advance because there is so much information, and it would be much more time efficient. Secondly, Ms. Jones said, if we could have digital copies sent to us, we could distribute them amongst our group, and we could review it in advance of our meeting, so when the person comes before us we have already formulated ideas, which are again time saving. This past month we received a document from Planning which left no place for us to put our comments. We need a place to put down our ideas so Planning and Zoning can see them and put them to good use for our applicants.

Supervisor Annabi asked if the ABACA Board can put comments on a piece of paper attached to the "Referral Request to ABACA" form which is being introduced. Ms. Jones said yes that would work, we can attach them to the form. We could even have a fillable form and transfer that information back to Planning and Zoning.

Highway Superintendent Shawn Keeler gave the following report:

Superintendent Keeler said that we are very lucky because five (5) of our laborers got certified in being able to use the bucket truck so that really helps the Town in so many ways. Before this we only had two (2) people who were able to use the bucket truck.

We are continuing our spring cleaning of our yard and building and will continue to straighten up to make it more useful and give us possible opportunities for home owners to come get wood and wood chips I will keep you all updated if we are able to make this happen. Speaking about it if any home owners are in need of wood or wood chips feel free to call the Highway garage at 845-526-3333 and we will gladly bring you whatever we can.

We have begun doing a large drainage project on Horton Hollow, On Tuesday April 26th with the help of Putnam County Highway we will begin the regrading and reshaping of Horton Hollow the process should take roughly 4 days weather permitting. Please avoid using Horton Hollow during this construction.

We have also been cutting shoulders on Denny town and South Highland Roads and will hopefully be able to do this all over town before the fall.

Our vacuum truck is now out cleaning catch basins around Town we will be continuing this until the fall with the hope of getting all basins in town cleaned by then.

SUPERVISOR'S COMMENTS

Supervisor Annabi said we are having a lot of people come by and pick up the trash grabbers and orange bags. She thanked the Highway Department for picking up the bags, and the residents for stepping up and cleaning up the road and their yards.

Supervisor Annabi announced the 2022 Bulk Drop-Off schedule:

Saturday, October 15th.

The hours of operation are from 8:45 AM to 11:45 AM. During these times and on these dates Town Hall will be open for business. Every office will be open with the exception of the Highway Department.

On Sunday, April 24th there will be a Community Shred Event from 10:00AM to 2:00PM in the Town Hall Parking Lot. This is free for all Putnam Valley Residents.

LEGISLATIVE REPORTS

Presented by Supervisor Annabi

County Legislator Montgomery thanked Supervisor Annabi for submitting her proposal for ARPA Funding. She is hoping that by the May County Meeting she will have more information about what is going to happening with the ARPA Funds for the Towns. Legislator Montgomery did say Putnam Valley is slated to receive over 1.2 million dollars. Supervisor Annabi said she received a phone call today from the County. They were looking for a cost analysis for our projects which she is in the process of submitting now. These projects are large and will probably not begin until next January.

County Legislator Montgomery said the Federal Government has introduced their 1.2 trillion dollar infrastructure bill. She added that Senator Schumer will be putting out a booklet that we can take a look at. Supervisor Annabi said the Town did apply for the Congressional appropriations. Legislator Montgomery said this might be different money and we should take a look at it as there is a lot of money out there now. There is also opioid money coming to the County.

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Legislator Montgomery said Household Hazardous Waste Clean-Up Day is April 30, 2022 from 9 AM to 12 noon at Fahnestock Park. She said don't forget the School Bus Safety Law passed.

The law puts a camera on School Buses which will take a picture of the license plate of cars that pass School Buses when they are flashing their red lights. This will allow the Police to find and prosecute people who pass a stopped School Bus.

Councilman Luongo said Oscawana Lake Road right by Kramer's Pond Road has an extremely large hole and there is a water problem there. There was a cone in the hole but that is gone now. Legislator Montgomery noted the location of the hole. Highway Superintendent Keeler said the County came out last Monday to access the hole, they came the next day and put cold patch in it. The day after that the cold patch was gone. Superintendent Keeler has called the County a couple of times after this and there has been no response.
