COMMUNITY REPORTS

Shawn Keeler gave the following report

Good evening, ladies and Gentlemen

I'd like to take a moment to thank the men and women of the Highway dept. for their continued hard work and dedication.

I would also like to take a moment to say a special Thank you to Joseph Fejes. Joe is retiring on June 27th having spent 32 ½ years at the Highway dept. Joe Actually worked for the Town for 9 years in the 70s and 80s so he technically has worked for the Town For 41. 5 years. We all wish Joe a Happy and Healthy Retirement.

We are currently working on Woods end road drainage we have added 3 basins and 90 ft of 12 Inch pipe.

Milling is scheduled to begin July 16th, and Blacktopping will begin July 23rd. Notices will go out in advance once we figure out where they are starting.

Wiccopee Rd culvert still awaiting a start date. We will keep everyone posted when dates are figured out.

Our Basins repair crew has repairing basins they will be out daily has we have several in need of repair. They repaired 95 YTD

Our Vac-ALL crew got started in Lake Peekskill and has Cleaned 195 basins YTD.

We Currently have 2 mowers out cutting vegetation on the sides of the roads.

Our bucket truck is currently out of service as we are getting it all new leveling cables and cable assemblies, as well as getting its annual recertification. Also, on June 2nd 11 of the Town Highway workers were certified in operating the Bucket Truck.

The phones at highway are monitored 24 / 7 and I ask residents with issues to call us and not post on Facebook as we don't troll for complaints. As well be sure to go on Town of Putnam Valley Highway Department Facebook page and like it to stay on top of all the doings of the Highway Dept.

** The Putnam County Dept of Health will be offering free MMR vaccines for measles,

mumps and rubella to individuals exposed during the recent measles case identified in early June. Other residents who are not immune to measles may receive free vaccine as well. Exposed contacts who get measles cannot be vaccinated, so the clinics will be held after the incubation period which ends on June 19th. Individuals who recover from measles are considered immune. However, contacts without immunity are being offered the free vaccine. Appointments are needed, please call 845-808-1332 to set up an appointment.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Jeanette Yetter from the Putnam Valley Board of Education gave the following speech.

Putnam Valley School District Update (May–June):

On May 8th, the Putnam Valley Board of Education reached out to the Town Board to strengthen collaboration and keep the broader community informed about school initiatives.

Facilities and Infrastructure:

- The high school, middle school, track, and turf are closed for scheduled repair and replacement, with work continuing through the summer.

Recognition:

- The district received the New York State Green Ribbon Award from the Board of Regents, honoring excellence in sustainability, environmental education, and wellness.
- Putnam Valley was one of only two districts in New York to receive the award this year (along with Bronxville).

School Highlights:

- **Elementary School:** Recent activities included a kindergarten show, Revolutionary War reenactments, and hands-on science labs with chicks and duck hatchings.
- **Middle School:** Officially certified as an International Baccalaureate (IB) World School, with the Middle Years Program now authorized.

Graduation and Student Success:

- The Class of 2025 graduation is scheduled for Friday, June 20th at 7 p.m. on the football field (pending weather), also streamed live at www.pvcsd.org.
- Students will pursue a wide range of post-graduation paths, including SUNY schools, private universities (e.g., Duke, Cornell, Ohio State), vocational careers, full-time employment, and gap years.

Upcoming School Events:
